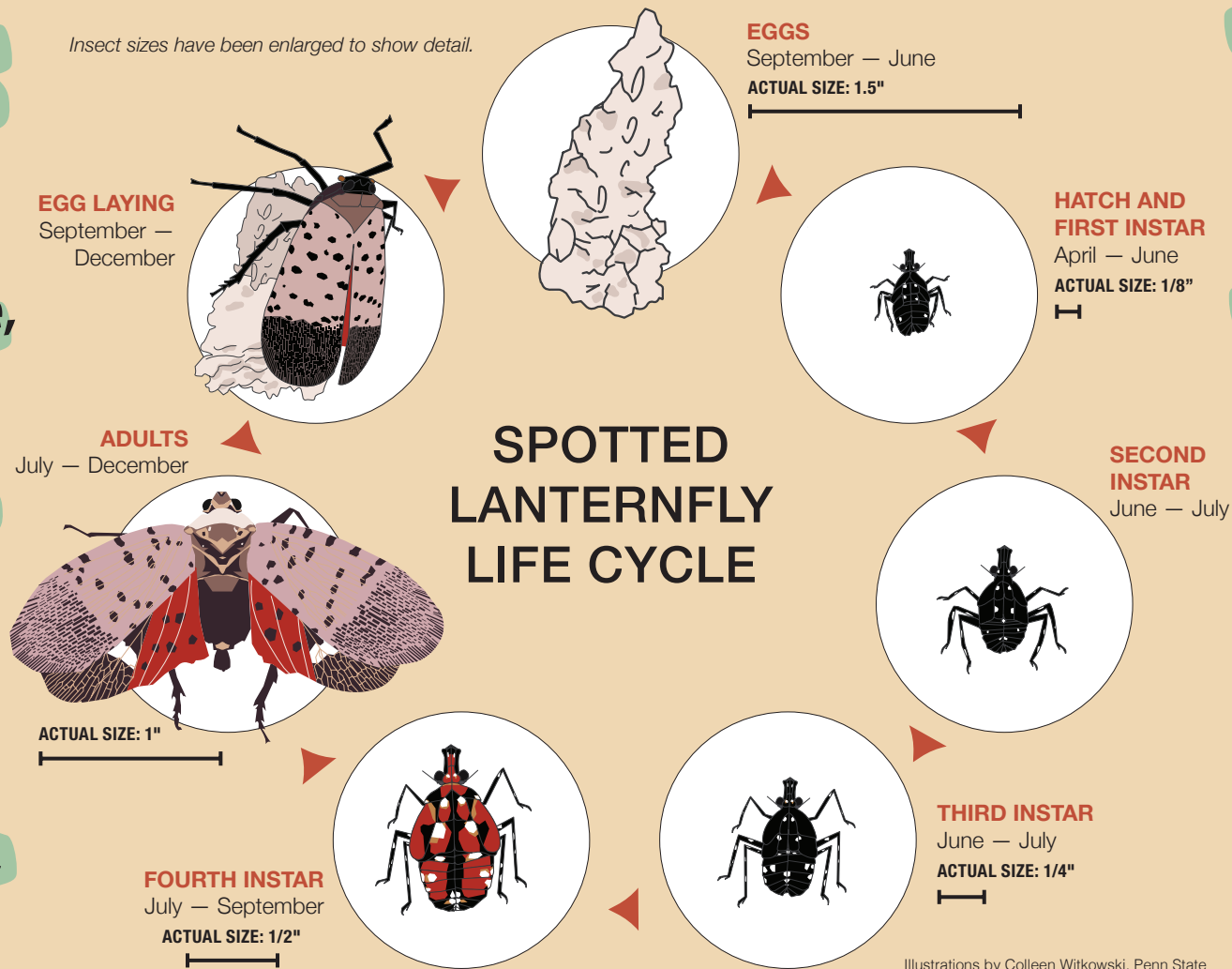


STOP THIS INVADER!

The **SPOTTED LANTERNFLY** is an invasive insect that can be moved to new places, tucked away in landscape materials, outdoor furniture, firewood, and vehicles. It attacks many trees and crops and has the potential to damage our forests and food supply. **SPOTTED LANTERNFLY** feeds on many different plants, including Tree-of-Heaven, grapevines, peaches, black walnut, and other important trees.



Adult **SPOTTED LANTERNFLIES** are gray and black, and have hind wings with bright red patches. Adults are about an inch long and are present between August and December.

You can help stop this bad bug by learning about it and by using a checklist when moving, take a day trip, or going camping to make sure the pest does not travel with you.

2. Before you travel, check for and destroy all Spotted Lanternfly eggs, nymphs, and adults that you find.
